
Travel to Swansea and Induction

Directions from Swansea Station to St Mary's Church Hall - a 10 minute walk

Come out of the main entrance of the station to the main road and turn left, crossing the minor road lvey Place. Carry straight on down the High Street, passing the Grand Hotel on our left. Keep going straight on until reaching the remains of Swansea Castle on our left. Here turn right along Caer Street to reach a roundabout. St Mary's is on the far side of the roundabout. We are approaching the church from the northeast. Go round to the south side to find the entrance for pilgrims.

Swansea to Port Talbot

DAY 2 Sunday August 14

Today's Theme Information

Swansea - 'An unlikely place for a miracle.'

LEADER: Sue and Fred Adilz

Today's walk leaves central Swansea (Abertawe) across the Sail Bridge over the Tawe via the docks and along the old Tennant Canal path through marshland to Jersey Marine. Past the Amazon warehouse, there is an unavoidable noisy stretch along the A483 and over the River Neath A48 flyover to prayers and lunch in Llansawel (Briton Ferry). The afternoon walk follows the coastal route of the South Wales Coast Path, past Brunel's Dock and Tower across saltmarsh and dunes to Baglan Bay with its magnificent views over Swansea Bay. The path continues along the beach and promenade to Aberavon Sands (toilets half way) and is likely to be busy; the industrial areas and shipping at Port Talbot are visible on the horizon. Thereafter, the route heads inland up the River Afan, via back streets to St Mary's, then along a short stretch of road to the church halls of the splendid Victorian Church of St Theodore's, funded by the Talbot family for the community.



Foolish pilgrims may buy lunch at McDonalds, which is opposite the roundabout. After lunch, reassemble for prayers in the modernist church of Our Lady of Assumption.

St Thomas Way Notes: The St Thomas Way from Swansea to Hereford is defined as a list of 13 locations that William Cragh and companions might have walked through. Nobody knows what route they actually took. No walking route has been defined between these locations previously, rather we have invented our own route linking the 13 locations for this pilgrimage. Today we head off from the first location Swansea in the direction of the second location which we reach tomorrow.

Profile (Scale 0 to 200 ft): Each day the route card shows the route profile. But don't be misled: be aware that it is a different scale each day! Today's profile is that of a very flat day, as we stay close to the coast. The OS height data does not know about bridges, so the profile has us walking across the surpisingly deep bed of the River Neath!

DAY 3 Monday August 15 Port Talbot to St Brides Major

Today's Theme Information

Margam - 'Beauty and ugliness side by side.'

LEADERS: Fr Tony Milner and David Fletcher

Today is quite a long day at 18.5 miles, with a fair bit of road walking, but incorporates two key sites: Margam Abbey and Ewenny Priory. For quite a bit of the walking we are on the Wales Coast Path, which we pick up after crossing under the M4. This takes us over some gentle hills to Margam Abbey, a Cistercian foundation from 1147. The nave of the abbey church is now the parish church, and further impressive ruins are found as we pass into Margam Country Park. After passing through the park we re-join the Welsh Coast Path, which for a while follows the A48 on a good footpath. This takes us to Pyle, and we go through the village to Kenfig Hill, where we find our lunch pub. From there we follow a mixture of minor roads and paths, including a disused railway line, via a DIY prayer stop at Laleston (which dates back to at least the 12th century) to our second major site of Ewenny Priory. The Priory is a Benedictine foundation from 1142, part of which is heavily fortified. Quite a lot of the original Norman architecture remains. We then continue along paths and minor roads to St Brides Major, our stop for the night. We will be split between the village hall and the scout lodge for sleeping.

St Fagans (visited tomorrow) 'A place to remind us that life was hard.'

Today is a rest day and pilgrims are free to plan their own timetable. We will have a service (format to be decided) in the hall at 09.30 for those who want it. There are various places pilgrims might want to go: **Stay in St Athan:** Down in the village which we walked through on the way in, there is the church, a few shops, a post office, a takeaway. and a pub.

Bus to Llantwit Major: There is a launderette but it only does service washes and you would need to catch the 8.43 but to get there at 9am for same-day service. There is also a leisure centre and the churches that we visited yesterday afternoon. Details of Llantwit Major will be put out in the hall.

Bus to Barry: Here there is a normal do-it-yourself launderette, a leisure centre and Barry Island is a seaside resort. We think this will be the most popular destination so more details are given below.

Bus to Cardiff: Amongst the attractions of the capital city of Wales are the castle and civic buildings in the city centre, and new attractions at Cardiff Bay


About the lunch pub: Busy pub which serves food, on a main road. Pilgrims do not have permission to eat their own food on the premises.

St Thomas Way Notes: Today we visit the 4th and 5th St Thomas Way places. Llancarfan is included because of the 15th-century wall-paintings which were uncovered in 2008 when an outer limewash layer was removed. In the case of St Fagans, it's the National Museum of History, which includes a re-erected medieval church which was moved stone by stone from elsewhere in Wales, but when we arrive there towards the end of a long day, it is already closed, so sadly visiting it doesn't work out for us. We visit the parish church instead.

Profile (Scale 0 to 1000 ft): A long day with some minor climbs. Over a minor ridge to reach Llancarfan then a gradual climb. We reach the hightest point of the day without realising it soon after lunch. After that we are following the direction of the Ely River but the footpaths take us up and down.

Today we shall be following the Taff Trail most of the way from Cardiff to Caerphilly. After the service at Llandaff Cathedral we shall walk close to the River Taff until we come to a footbridge just after the M4 motorway. We then turn right and it is only then a short walk to Tongwynlais and the Lewis Arms for lunch where we will be made very welcome. The food and drink is very good too but you will have to eat your own elsewhere.

After lunch we climb a road up to Castell Coch for a short break before we tackle an even steeper climb up through the woods. Once at the top the walk remains fairly wooded until we reach Caerphilly, the chief feature of which is its castle. Our accommodation in Caerphilly is split between 2 church halls.





Abergavenny - 'A place for dreaming.'

LEADERS: Geoff Murray, Jack O'Boyle and Stuart Pomfret We start with prayers at the Priory Church outside of which is the grave of Fr David Lewis, one of the 40 Martvrs of England and Wales. Then we celebrate mass in the church co-dedicated to him.

This is a peaceful, quiet walk. You will only pass through one village between Usk and Abergevenny. The route includes walking along the River Usk, much of it on the Usk Valley Walk. Near the end we walk along the tow path of the delightful Monmouthshire and Brecon Canal. There is a section, too long a section, of very quiet country lanes which we take due to the lack of suitable footpaths. On the whole the walk itself is fairly flat except a very short section up to the canal. Enjoy this walk. Our accommodation in Abergavenny is split between 2 halls



We encourage pilgrims to attend the public services in the priory church, where we are staying, and/or the Catholic Church, listed below. There is lots to see in Abergarvenny: the Priory Church itself with the Jesse Tree and stained-glass Jesse window and Tithe Barn; the castle and museum; Linda Vista Gardens and Castle Meadows with walk down to the River Usk; it's market day today. 

Laundry Services: In Abergavenny, only service washes are available at 2 different venues, and these must be booked in advance of the day. Alternatively, catch the train to Cwmbran where there is a real launderette in Morrison's Car Park. See Chris Nussbaum for details of these possibilities.

Leisure Centre: 21 minute walk from the Priory. Public Swimming £4.15, whole pool 14.00 - 15.00, looks the best option. There are showers.

DAY 12 Wednesday August 24 Abergavenny to Longtown

Patrishow - 'A place of inner and outer vision.'

14.3 miles

Today is a long and tough walk over varied terrain. Once up out of Abergavenny we track around the contours of the Sugar Loaf. We start on access lanes then over ragged farmland before reaching country lanes which will come as a bit of a relief. The very ancient and interesting church of St Issui is up on the hillside. We will stop here for refreshments so bring your rolls. There are miles to go and a ridge to traverse before reaching Llanthony. Here there are three places for further refreshments in the afternoon. The Half Moon pub for a pint, a cafe on the way in or a cafe under the hotel by the Priory. The church of St David by the Priory is the place to meet for a prayer stop after snacks. Another ridge looms before us with Offa's Dyke path to cross on the top (after 270m of the last ascent). The view over Herefordshire opens out from the top and the village of Longtown is below us. Some of us will be staying in the village hall and some in the outdoor education centre.

About the lunch pub: The Half Moon is a traditional Welsh Inn, originally built as two workmen's cottages in the 1700s. Pilgrims have a choice of the Half Moon, the cellar bar of the Priory Hotel and a campsite café that we pass on the way in to Llanthony. We have not made a booking in any of these places, so we may not eat our own food in them.

St Thomas Way Notes: Patrishow and Longtown are the 10th and 11th places of the St Thomas Way. For Patrishow, the attraction is St Issui's Church and the holy well next to which St Issui is said to have had his hermitage. For Longtown it's the castle and the setting in the landscape.

Profile (Scale 0 to 2500 ft): This is the hilliest day of this pilgrimage with 3300 ft of ascent but Bruce has done well to keep the distance down to 14.3 miles. We climb out of Abergavenny into the Black Mountains and then there are ups and downs as we cross river valleys. Late in the day comes the highest point of this year's pilgrimage, where we meet the Offa's Dyke long distance path, which in this locality also forms the border between Wales and England.

A longer walk than the crow flies! A short morning with two prayer stops and one steep climb and great views, then an early lunch in Walterstone. Be prepared to climb some difficult stiles and a gate and encounter noisy dogs in farms and maybe crawl under an electric fence! Bring cash for food and drinks as the Carpenter's Arms lunch stop does not take cards! The long afternoon route is mostly through fields with shortish, quiet road stretches and a couple of steep climbs and descents. There will be two or three short prayer stops, including Rowlestone Church with its special C.11th carvings and Dore Abbey at the very end of the day. When we arrive in Ewyas Harold, our accommodation is split over two halls.




Hereford Celebration Day - 'A place that finally became home to a saint.'
