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Dear Pilgrims

The 2009 Pilgrimage to Lindisfarne is almost upon us, and we've proved wrong those who said it couldn't be done within the usual September to July planning cycle. A great team effort has found accommodation, planned the walking routes, liaised with churches we will visit, scheduled our waking moments, and taken the details of the pilgrims who are joining us this year - and all from the other end of the country.

Lindisfarne was the clear favourite destination when we discussed possibilities at Salisbury last year, and it has proved more popular than we'd dared hope: numbers are higher than for many years, almost approaching those of the early 1980s, with a high proportion (65%) booked "all the way". Among these pilgrims we welcome a substantial number of people walking with us for the first time and several returning after some time away, who will journey to Lindisfarne with the regulars. I hope we can share the pilgrim spirit with our new comrades, and I also anticipate an injection of "new life" from them.



A song that was popular with pilgrims when we last walked to Lindisfarne 25 years ago included the line "Verse 6, same old tricks" (yes, we still sing it!), and much of the formula that has made our pilgrimages so successful over the years will be unchanged again this year. But we don't stand still, and there will be a few changes: for example, with greater numbers than usual, making sure we use the available space efficiently is essential, especially to ensure that the later arrivals can find space to sleep, so be prepared for a "bed-space manager" directing traffic on arrival.

Some change is forced upon us, and this will be the first pilgrimage in 30 years where Frances Dean has not masterminded our catering, serving up amazing meals in the most unpropitious circumstances, and positive feasts when allowed near a decent kitchen. Sadly Frances has been battling with her health since Christmas, and is unable to continue in her role. I have no doubt that we all send our thanks and prayers to Frances, who will be with us in spirit I am sure.

We are extremely lucky to welcome Alexe Parker as our new caterer, who brings experience of catering for similar groups, including a lot of work with the Guides. For the second week, Imelda Simons and Mary Yeomans will take over catering to allow Alexe to walk - taking on board feedback last year that a non-walking newcomer can be a little isolated. Of course, we can all help to make sure that the caterers are not isolated by volunteering for those important little jobs like stirring soup and washing up the pots and pans.

That's an appropriate point to remind us all that the pilgrimage is a team effort - and it works because everyone does their bit. This is no more true than in the morning, when we have to pack up and get on the road: we all have to make sure that we're ready for the day, but please help out with the many little jobs that need doing before we can start the day: if you're fit, volunteer to carry luggage or equipment to the van, or sweep the floor. If you need to sit down - there are lunches to be made every evening...

Every year we send out information on how to prepare for the pilgrimage, but it is evident that we all get fitter as the days pass, and we cover the miles more quickly. This year, however, because of the terrain we are crossing, there is no easy start: it's in at the deep end! So please do try to come prepared: make sure your boots are walked in, and do several practice walks of reasonable length and hilliness.

So much for the practical challenges: the pilgrimage is essentially a spiritual activity. We have prepared a theme (included in the route notes) around the strap line "On a Mission... Messengers of God's Gift of Love" divided over the 3 phases of the pilgrimage. We start with "What is Pilgrimage?" and look at the ideals; then "What are the Barriers to growth?" and finally "What are the Practicalities?" Each day has a specific theme relating to these headings as they affect us today, and is linked to one of the Celtic saints or an aspect of the Celtic Church. The theme is core to the reflection offered to us in our main worship, and pilgrims leading individual "God Stops" en route are encouraged to build on the day's theme. Bill and Mary will be looking for volunteers, so don't be shy if you have something to share, and look at the theme to see where it might fit. Resources are available - just ask.

This will be a special pilgrimage for me – 25 years since our previous Lindisfarne Pilgrimage, my first as chief routeplanner – and being on Holy Island on St Aidan’s Eve. I pray that it will be special for each and every one of you, through the journey we make, the companions we share or the fleeting encounters along the way.

Those who cannot be with us this year: please pray for us, as we will for you. If you can, follow our progress daily on the web site (<http://live.thepilgrims.org.uk>) and be part of the world-wide virtual pilgrimage. We appreciate all the messages of support and the prayer requests, even if we are too tired to reply to them individually!

God Bless – and don’t forget your preparations!



### ***Andy Bashford R.I.P.***

There maybe some of you long walking pilgrims who remember one of our early characters from the pilgrimages – Andy Bashford.

Colin Hooper spotted in an Emmaus newsletter that an Andy Bashford who had been in their community some years before had passed away. I went up and saw the team that lead Emmaus in Portslade to try to find out if it was our Andy Bashford from the early days of pilgrimages.

Eventually, we found one of their old Newsletters. Although the photo wasn't brilliant, you could see a resemblance, a slightly chubbier Andy with a smile on his face. Their Andy Bashford's old stomping ground was Reigate, he was doing gardening (and had done a bit of chef's work) He was also dyslexic and while with Emmaus, went on a course to overcome this and did rather well by all accounts. Sadly, it all fits.

Our Andy was a happy character whose imagination knew no bounds when it came to telling stories. He led many a sensible person on a merry dance around reality. You never quite knew what Andy would do next... if the right thing to do was to arrive in a suite, he'd be in jeans and a tee-shirt. If we were all in jeans and a tee-shirt... guess who'd be in a suite, or wearing a cowboy's hat. Aidan met him at Buckfast when planning the 1996 pilgrimage there; he says, "we were just walking through the abbey grounds and he appeared!"

Talking with the Emmaus team, it seems that Andy had Diabetes and had previously had a heart attack before staying with them. The information they had was that he was up in lodgings in the Cambridge area – no one knew why – and was found dead when neighbours reported that they hadn't seen him for a while but his dog was barking.

Now the usual thing is to add our deceased pilgrims to our prayer list but with our unique Andy Bashford... I can't help but wonder if it's not one of his best stories yet and he'll turn up at the end of a pilgrimage wearing a suite telling yet another yarn about how he was just spending a bit of time with his mate Lazarus when...
