2008 means EVESHAM to SALISBURY

Slightly later than in recent years. Saturday August 16th - Sunday 31st August.

As we were later coming to a decision on the destination, route and date it has inevitably delayed the search for Halls. Keith and Pat, ably assisted by Danny have started work, but weather, distance and lack of large Halls, with the ongoing issue of School kitchens are all causing difficulties. As John Chenery receives news of Halls being booked he is sending out instructions to the Route Planners, of whom we have an abundance this year - Patrick and the Chenerys waiting in the wings in case of an emergency!! I had hoped to start reconnoitring Stow to Northleach in early January, but an attack of Back Spasm (Over Christmas - Is there no Justice in this world?) has put it on the back burner (groan).

Whilst planning on the ground has been a little slow, the spiritual preparation has advanced apace. Starting from a Shrine to Our Lady dating from the Medieval Evesham Abbey and heading to the magnificent Salisbury Cathedral, celebrating the 750th Anniversary of Consecration, dedicated to the Annunciation, meant a Marian Theme was ideal. Are you getting the news?

Keeping people informed about pilgrimage activities is a balance between cost and coverage, so the mailing list is split into 4 parts:

- "Active pilgrims" (been on a pilgrimage in the last few years or booked for the current year) and "life members", who get all 3 mailings each year;
- "Less active pilgrims" (been on a pilgrimage some time back), who get just the February mailing;
- "Inactive pilgrims" (moved without a forwarding address or asked not to be mailed) who receive no mailings;
- "E-pilgrims" who receive all 3 mailings by e-mail only.

This issue we've included a summary of news from the last 2 issues, for those who only get the annual mailing.

The Pilgrimage Theme 2008 – The Magnificat

On a cold November Sunday afternoon, Fr. David Russell, Keith Donachie, Sue Adilz and I met in my house to begin forming the theme for this year's Pilgrimage from Evesham to Salisbury.

With Evesham being a shrine to Our Lady and Salisbury Cathedral also dedicated to her as the Blessed Virgin Mary, we focused on Mary's great prayer, the Magnificat. We took phrases from the prayer and looked at their meaning and relevance for us today.

About the Magnificat

The Magnificat [Latin: magnifies], also called the Canticle or Song of Mary, is recorded in the Gospel of Luke (1:46-55). It is the Virgin Mary's joyous prayer in response to her cousin Elizabeth's (John the Baptist's mother) greeting (Luke 1: 41-45). This great hymn forms part of the Church's prayer in the Divine Office (Evening Prayer or Evensong). When it is recited as part of the Office, it is followed by the Gloria Patri ("Glory be"). The traditional sung Magnificat is in Latin plainchant. One of the hymn's most glorious musical renditions is the version of the Magnificat by J.S. Bach.

The Magnificat appears below in one of its many English translations.

My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour.

He looks on his servant in her lowliness; henceforth all ages will call me blessed.

The Almighty works marvels for me. Holy his name! His mercy is from age to age, on those who fear him.

He puts forth his arm in strength and scatters the proud-hearted.

He casts the mighty from their thrones, and raises the lowly.

He fills the starving with good things, sends the rich away empty.

He protects Israel, his servant. Remembering his mercy, the mercy promised to our fathers, to Abraham and his sons forever.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be. Amen

Each walking day has a "sub-theme" on to which we can reflect, and hook our thoughts to during the Prayer Stops and other Services.

Day 2 Introduction to Magnificat – the prayer and practice; discernment.



Day 3 Mary and the role of Women in the Church – then and now. Let Mary's "Yes" be my "Yes".

Day 4 *My soul magnifies the Lord.* The prayer of listening and reflecting – what is God calling me to do?

Day 5 *His mercy is on those who fear him.* Confronting Fear – What am I getting into? Facing challenges to come.

Day 7 *The Almighty works marvels for me.* Learning to Trust – I am safe in God's hands.

Day 8 *Holy his name!* The power of the Spirit to work within me to do God's work.

Day 9 *He scatters the proud-hearted.* Dealing with pride - God cannot use me if I block the action of the Holy Spirit.

Day 10 *He has filled the hungry with good things.* Living

simply – meeting my needs and the needs of others.

- Day 12 *He protects Israel, his servant. Remembering his mercy. God's mercy – I may fail, but I can always start again.*
- Day 13 *My spirit rejoices in God my Saviour. Commitment – my "Yes" to what God is calling me to do. I am God's hands and feet in this World.*
- Day 14 *As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be. Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit.*

Prayer Stops or "God Stops", as we affectionately call them, are not only opportunities to rest our weary legs but times also to enrich our weary spirits. For those pilgrims speaking a time for sharing and catharsis; for those hearing, oases of enlightenment and self-growth.

As we walk we can magnify the spirit of pilgrimage to those we meet and spread the Good News. Let's make this "Magnificat Pilgrimage" a glorifying, and magnificent experience!
